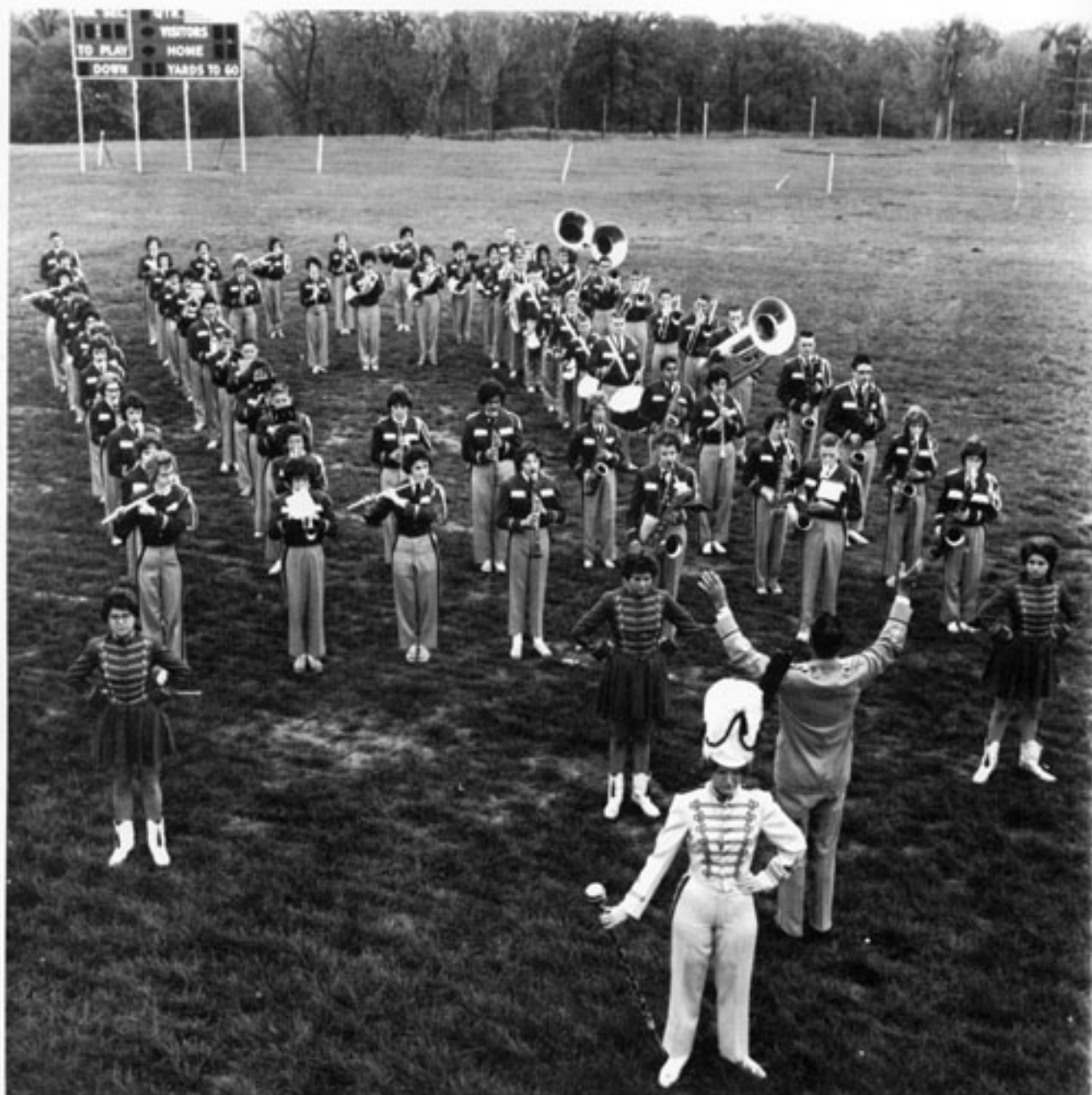




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DEDICATION

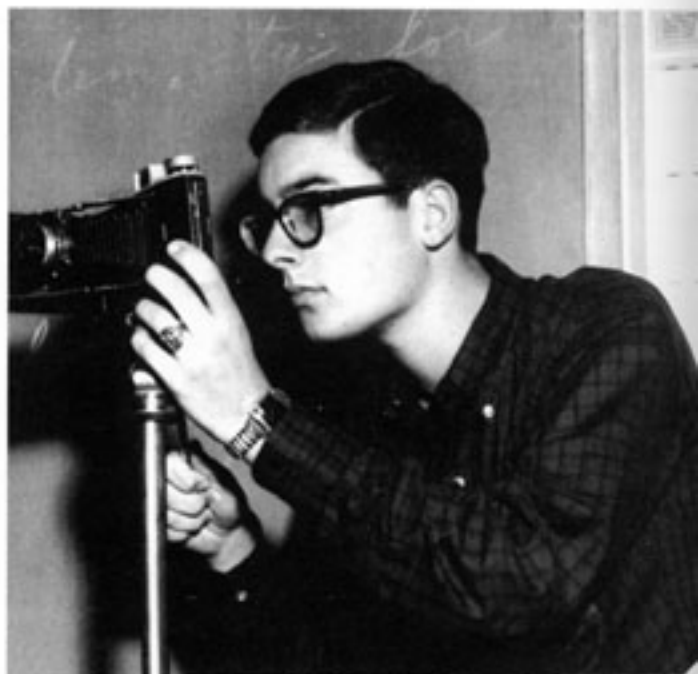

STUDENTS OBTAIN USEFUL BUSINESS KNOWLEDGE

The business department started the fundamental education of students by offering general business and beginning typing in preparation for advanced courses in this field.

The advanced course of bookkeeping instructed the students in the ways of preparing business forms and the keeping of books for a business by the use of practice sets and projects.

After learning the key board, typing students did simple exercises, letters, telegrams, and other business papers. Speed tests were practiced throughout the year to improve speed and accuracy. During the year students were instructed in the ways to cut stencils and reproduce such copy on the mimeograph.

Shorthand not only prepared the student to take dictation after graduation but also proved quite helpful in taking notes in other classes.

An advanced course known as secretarial practice familiarized students with the transcriber, dictaphone, and electric typewriters to help them in obtaining jobs in offices. Many useful facts about the business world were learned which will help them in years to come.

SOCIAL STUDIES KEEP STUDENTS WELL INFORMED

Students have been kept well informed and up to date with world events through social science courses offered at O. H. S.

American history brought out the development of America from its discovery to the present time. Supplemental reading was stressed to enrich the student's understanding and enjoyment of personalities and events which made our country so unique. A term paper was required to enlighten a student in acquiring source material, in the preparation of a formal research paper and the methods used in the construction of the paper.

American government, similar to history, gave the students knowledge of the structural system used in our democracy.

In drivers training students not only learned driving habits from the book, but also through experience behind the wheel. A period of class-room work preceded the time when the student sat behind the wheel.

Psychology, different from most of the other courses offered in the social studies, brought out behavior of the group and the individual. A term paper based on subjects discussed in class was also required for this course.

MATHEMATICS STIMULATES THE MINDS OF STUDENTS

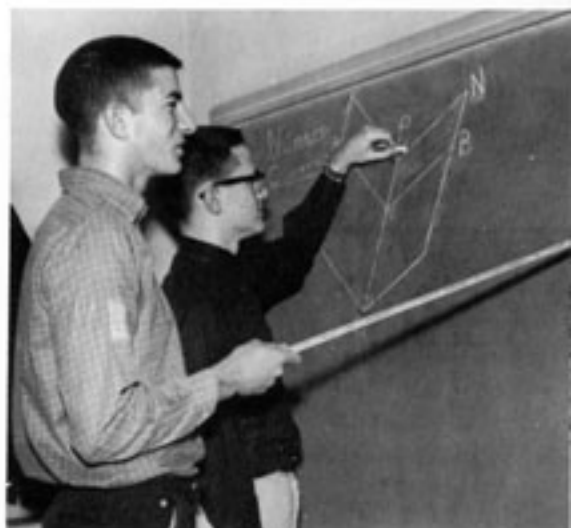
Mathematics was useful in stimulating the minds of the students.

General math was basically a review course covering material learned in previous math courses.

Algebra, a more advanced course of math, presented ways of adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing equations. The students were presented with problems dealing in powers, roots, and series of numbers. An advanced course was offered which went into a more detailed study in these fields.

Geometry deals with objects that have dimensions--length, breadth, and thickness. Plane geometry was used to measure flat surfaces. Solid geometry brought out the need to measure objects that are or could have been solid. Students learned postulates, axioms, and theorems which were used in working problems.

Trigonometry was offered to students who would later take more mathematics, possibly for their life work. In this course the work primarily dealt with triangles.

STUDENTS ARE ENCOURAGED IN THE FIELD OF SCIENCE

The science department of O. H. S. encouraged students in the field of biological and physical science by offering a variety of courses.

General science which was offered to beginners or less scientific-minded students gave a foundation in the exploration of science. In this course students did simple experiments and learned basic scientific information which would be helpful to them.

Most students selected to take biology which brought out the study of all living matter. The students learned the functions of the systems in different forms of life. They did experiments, and dissected small animals to see the organs within these animals.

Physics, the science dealing with natural laws and processes and the states and properties of matter and energy other than those restricted to living matter and chemical changes, was taken by seven students. These students worked experiments, held discussion, and worked problems dealing with material offered in this field.

In chemistry the students studied about the elements which composed the earth. Experiments were conducted to see the reactions of different compounds when mixed by the students. Discussion on the subject matter was given along with these experiments.

PHYS ED DEPARTMENT STRIVES FOR PHYSICAL FITNESS

Physical education classes kept students in good physical condition.

Health was taken by freshmen only. They studied bone structure and digestive and circulatory systems of the body and were instructed in personal hygiene of the body.

In girls phys ed such games as softball, deck tennis, volleyball, bowling, basketball, and table tennis were played along with instructions in square, folk, and ballroom dancing.

The program for boys in the phys ed department included tumbling, volleyball, basketball, softball, boxing, football, and calisthenics. Students were required to take a physical fitness test at the end of the year.

An intramural program was offered to all high school girls. Volleyball, basketball, and table tennis tournaments were held. Letter awards were given to the most outstanding player in each sport.

LANGUAGE ARTS TEACHES PROPER USAGE

Proper usage was taught in English to insure the correct way to write essays, term papers, and book reports. This should be carried over to every day life.

In literature students read many interesting stories which helped to improve their vocabulary.

Speech class was very active this year. Short speeches were assigned at first and were lengthened as the year progressed. Debating and dramatic readings were stressed.

FOREIGN LANGUAGES BROADEN STUDENTS' VIEWPOINT

Foreign languages were important to those interested in the customs and languages of other countries.

Latin students not only learned the language but also came in contact with the history, customs, and religious practices of the Roman Empire. Translation of Latin to English and again to Latin was practiced. The learning of the Latin vocabulary began the course with the gradual introduction of sentences and stories.

Spanish students while learning that language also came in contact with the customs of Spain and South American countries.

INDUSTRIAL ARTS INSTRUCTS THE HANDS AS WELL AS THE MIND

Accuracy and neatness were very important in mechanical drawing classes.

The students learned the parts of an inch and the correct way of printing. They were instructed in the ways to keep papers neat, and the proper way to letter, number, and dimension their plates. Advanced students had to learn how to visualize shapes and objects unseen to the eye.

Shop, also offered in the industrial arts department, instructed students in the rules for safety procedures around machinery. Boys had to present plans of projects for approval before actual work began on them. In this course students had to learn the proper use and care of tools.

Home economics has been helpful to many students.

Food classes started by reading and learning of basic foods from the book before the actual cooking began. Simple foods were selected to start the classes in the preparation of a menu. Before the first semester was over the food classes had prepared and served several dinners during the lunch hour.

Clothing, also offered by the home economics department, taught students how to interpret instructions and patterns, put in hems and baste correctly. After completion of the course a student was able to sew a complete outfit for herself.

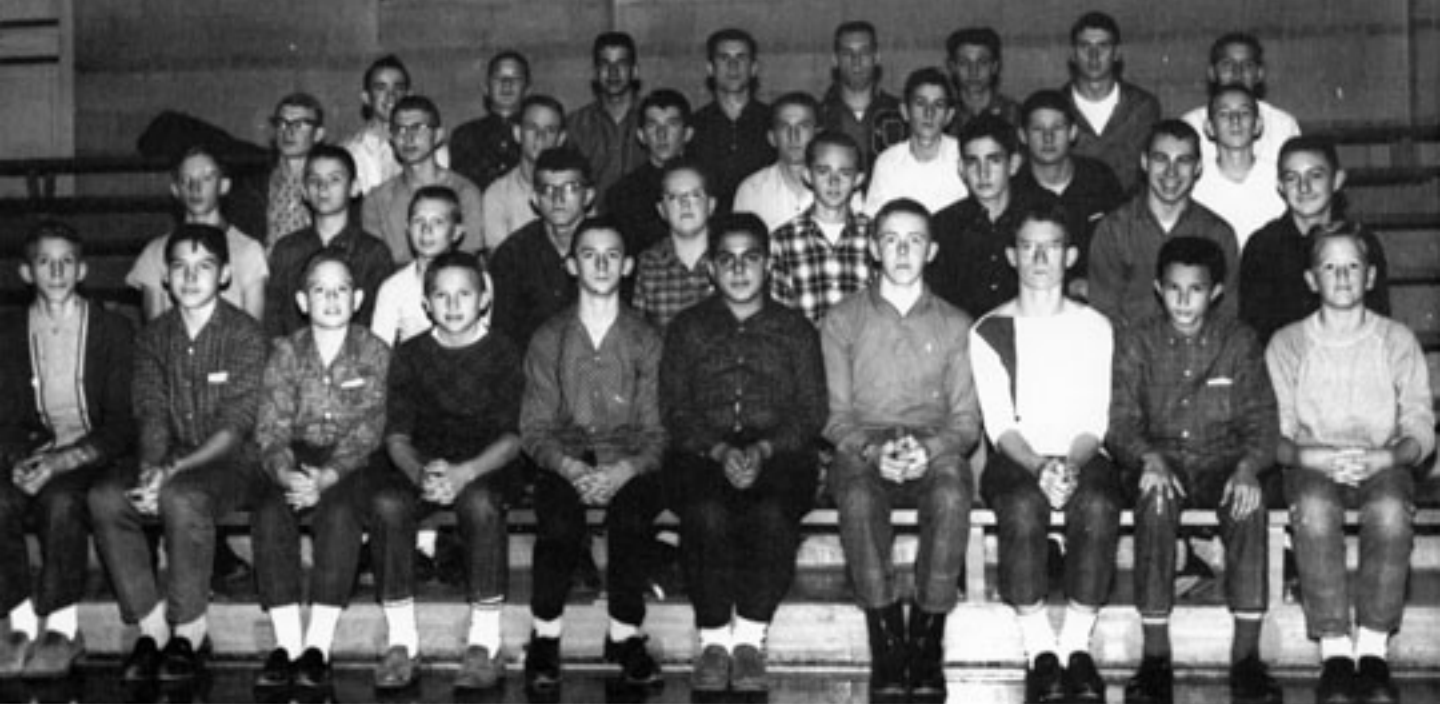

TROJANS KEEP TOM-TOM TO SET NEW RECORD

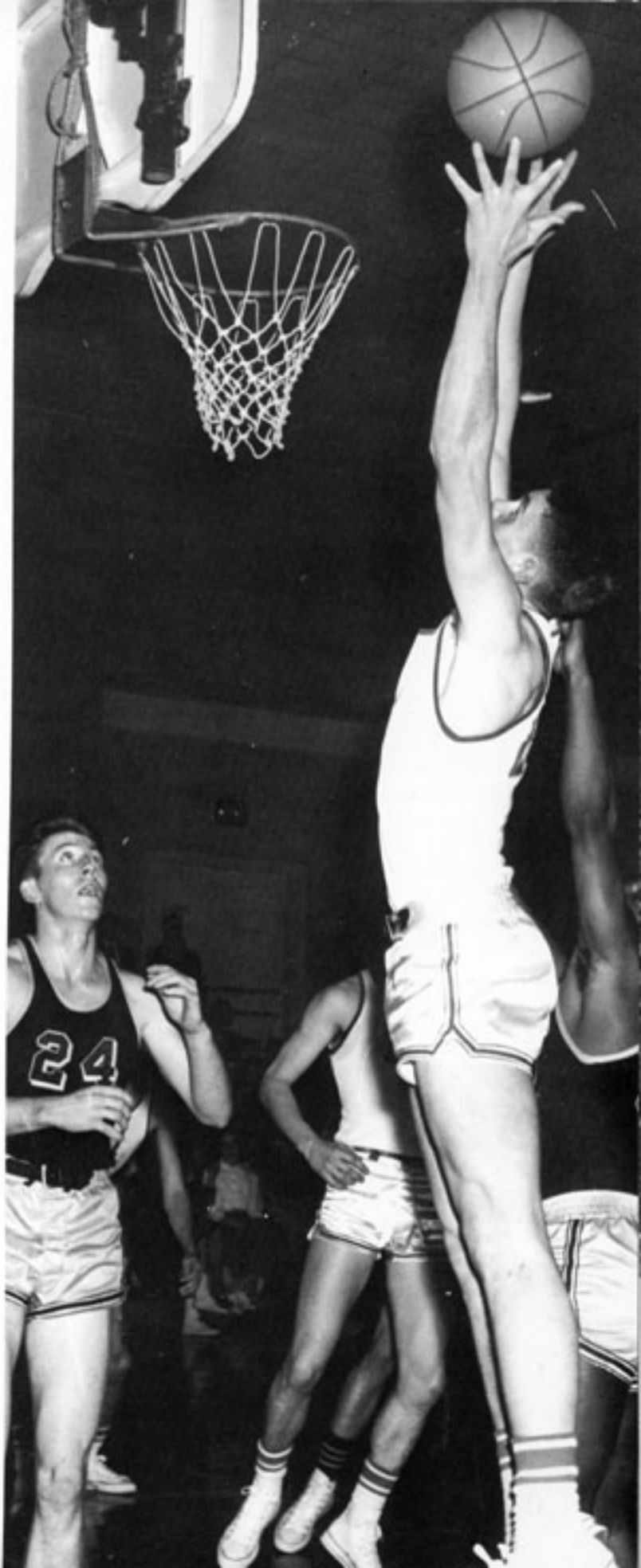
On November 9, 1962, the Trojans defeated the Panthers by a score of 26-7 to keep the Tom-Tom for O.H.S. another year.

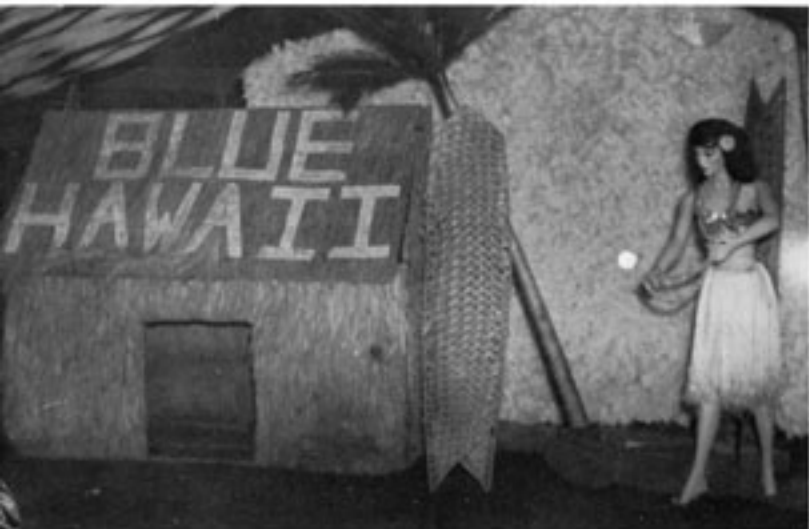
JUNIOR-SENIOR PROM IN BLUE HAWAII
